Under the resources section of the site you can find many useful products such as the original (and in my opinion) best PECS book, symbols, boardmaker, timetables, pocket books and the packs of sensory toys.

Oxygen therapy benefits autistic children.

In 6 centres in the United States, 62 children aged two to seven with autism were randomly assigned to receive 40 hours of treatment over a month with 24% oxygen at increased atmospheric pressure or normal air in a slightly pressurised room.

Children who received the treatment showed significant improvements in overall functioning, receptive language, social interaction, eye contact, and sensory or cognitive awareness. 30% of the children treated were rated by doctors to be improved or much improved, compared to 8% of those in the room with normal air.

It is not known if these improvements are long or short term at the moment, or why some children respond to the treatment better than others.

Study leader, Dr Dan Rossignol from the International Child Development Resource Centre, in Florida was initially sceptical, but he was prompted to look into it further as he has 2 sons with autism.

Professor Philip James, an expert from Dundee said that that oxygen was the "controller of inflammation" but also had other effects on regulation of genes and tissue regeneration.

It may not be for everyone, it certainly isn't a cure. "All the oxygen is doing is bringing things towards normal."

Yoko Unveils Original Mural for Autism Awareness.

Yoko Ono, the 76-year-old widow of slain former Beatle John Lennon, will unveil a mural at UN headquarters next month in honour of World Autism Awareness Day, an advocacy group. Yoko is an avant-garde artist and has named her mural 'Promise'. It will be auctioned off to raise money for the advocacy group 'Autism Speaks'. It will be unveiled on the 2nd Annual World Autism Awareness Day (WAAD) on April 2.



WAAD was created by a UN General Assembly resolution in December 2007 to increase public awareness about autism and to stress the importance of early diagnosis and intervention.

Yoko was born in Tokyo into a wealthy banking family. She was raised in both Japan and the United States before becoming known as an avant-garde conceptual artist and musician.

She is perhaps most famous for having married rock-and-roll legend and Beatles co-founder Lennon in 1969. He was murdered in New York in December 1980.

Autism Awareness Rally Lead by Parents of Autistic Child.

Hundreds of parents are expected to attend a march on Saturday which was organised by Mr and Mrs Hawkins who have a 6 year old autistic son, Edward, to call for more support for families with autism and further research, acting under the name Open Your Eyes to Autism.

Lara and Mark Hawkins, of Crayford, are concerned that autism often goes unrecognised and thousands of children are excluded from school or just don't go at all. They feel that specialised schools are overwhelmed and do not have enough spaces for all who need them. They believe that the government are not taking enough action.

Recent results from Cambridge University research suggests that autism rates are nearly twice as high as the traditionally accepted rate of one in 100 children.

"Some 30 years ago they said autism affected one in 10,000 children. Today, we think the figure for boys could be as many as one in 38."

A letter from each parent march, has been prepared to be handed in to 10 Downing Street.

Christine Bett, deputy chair of Bromley Autistic Trust, said that on top of schooling needs not being recognised too little money was spent on research into autism.





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She added: "Autism costs £28 billion to the country each year through care and lost working hours.

"Everyone knows what cerebral palsy or leukaemia is, and while autism affects more people than those put together, it receives half the attention.

"The huge effect it has on families is not being recognised."


Look in to our eyes and you can see our love for you. A smile creeping out the corner of our lips and a giggle at your silly mistakes. Its our way of saying I really do love you.
